

Q. Different leaderboard watching, looking for different things on the board I suppose?

ADAM BLYTH: Yeah, my mindset was kind of just to make birdies today and cut out the mistakes, really play a smart round. The birdies are there to have, but to not drop shots and give them away easily because, you know, and I did kind of monitor that top 24 and the top 8. So you're very aware of everything that's happening. I think you need to be because you can't really -- you want to play your own game, yes, but you need to know what's going on in case you're on the 24 or you're just inside where you can play a bit smarter than normal or you need some birdies and get aggressive. So it's pretty interesting because there was a lot going on out there.

Q. How do you feel you are as a match player, when did you last play match play?

ADAM BLYTH: Yeah, amateur days. I really enjoy match play. It's going to be very interesting six-hole match play, you know. It's kind of you've just got to get away to a good start really and hang in there. You know, six holes is a real shootout and anyone can really do well over that period. So I think it doesn't really matter. If you're top 24 you can -- 24th can win it this week. It's really back to square one in a sense. I know the top 8 do get the free ride for the first round, but it's really kind of scrapped and gone back to square one.

Q. When did you actually play match play for the last time?

ADAM BLYTH: I think it would have been my amateur days, I would have played Queensland. We won the state series.

Q. What year would that have been?

ADAM BLYTH: 2004.

Q. Okay. Did you beat any prominent players that have gone on to be pros?

ADAM BLYTH: Yeah, Leishman, I beat him two and one, and then I beat Andrew McKenzie three and two. I played Simmie, he beat me down the last one.

Q. What course was that?

ADAM BLYTH: That was Royal Queensland. Yeah, Queensland won it, yeah.

Q. Okay. When you play sort of pickup games match play just with your mates at your home course, what do you play for?

ADAM BLYTH: Yeah, usually play (Inaudible) and Paul Hayden who are members at Indooroopilly and we will play \$20 in each Wednesday usually.

Q. Twenty dollars in and whoever wins gets 40 bucks?

ADAM BLYTH: Yeah, yep.

Q. Indooroopilly?

ADAM BLYTH: Yeah.

Q. So what sort of confidence has the whole week given you for things like this, you might have come in thinking, you know, position I haven't been in before, but now you've been in it before?

ADAM BLYTH: Yeah, it's just like being put in those positions, becomes a little bit more normal each time you get in that position. You become a little more comfortable and that's the nice thing. And then as that continues you start to feel like you belong in that position. So it's all about, yeah, the confidence of being comfortable I guess in those positions.

Q. What do you have planned for the rest of the year, where are you going to play your golf?

ADAM BLYTH: We'll see how this tomorrow turns out, but I have a kind of a membership in the Asian Tour, so this is great to count for that. So hopefully I'll rerank okay and get some more events towards the Asian Tour. I'll get a couple in Europe with Austria and Dunhill and play the main events here in Australia as well.

Q. Okay. Back to tomorrow, is there anyone that you wouldn't like to come up against?

ADAM BLYTH: No, no, it really doesn't matter too much. I think whoever's made it is playing well, and like I said, over six holes you've just got to make some birdies and do it early I think, but it's just going to be -- I'm really just happy to be in that scene tomorrow and see how it turns out and just let it go, you know. There's really no pressure anymore. I think just go out, free-wheel your game and see how it turns out.

Q. Do you like your slow methodical little swing with a little pause, that slow rhythm?

ADAM BLYTH: It's just come about through time, that and my dad and I have really worked on it and found if I can go as slow as possible back and get my hips and everything in shape, once I get to the top then I can just let it go and, yeah, that slow back swing just sets it all up.

Q. Whereabouts are you living at the moment?

ADAM BLYTH: Near Indooroopilly, near the course, yeah.

Q. How far from the course?

ADAM BLYTH: Four minutes.

Q. Okay. (Inaudible.)

ADAM BLYTH: Yeah, the shopping center yeah, near the train station.

Q. So you go to that little Thai place there, hole in the wall?

ADAM BLYTH: I have sometimes, yeah, it's good.

Q. Okay. And when were you last in Perth, do you still call that home?

ADAM BLYTH: Yes, that was Christmastime, saw my mom and family.

Q. What do your parents do up there?

ADAM BLYTH: My dad and my mom are separated, so my dad works Indooroopilly Golf Club, he's the manager of facilities, yeah, the clubhouse and all the machinery. And my mom is retired now with her new husband and he's just retired recently. So just living life really, traveling.
