

PATRICK CANTLAY (-10)

Q. (In progress) players that looked like they were struggling out there and the players that were doing pretty well. You've had so much experience here at Riviera, what's the challenge really on this golf course?

PATRICK CANTLAY: Yeah, I think it's staying patient because there's certain holes where you feel like you should just make a birdie a bunch, but it sneaks up and gets you if you don't hit a great shot. Great shots are rewarded around here and mediocre ones are punished, so you have to stay patient.

Q. You got yourself in position. Obviously we know over the years on the PGA TOUR no lead is safe. As you go into tomorrow's round, is there anything in particular you're going to change to try to get into the mix a little more?

PATRICK CANTLAY: Not at all. You have to get off to a hot start with 1 and if you can make some birdies early on on this golf course, you get some more chances in the middle of the round and I'll aim to do that tomorrow.

Q. Take us through the day and what your main takeaways are.

PATRICK CANTLAY: Yeah, I thought I played well today, really solid. I hit a couple good putts that I thought could have gone and didn't, so I'll try and get off to a hot start tomorrow. It's a golf course I love, so I'm looking forward to it.

Q. (Inaudible) plenty of putts, although you mentioned those that did not go in. What was the most important momentum moment for you today?

PATRICK CANTLAY: A really nice par save on 15. That hole location is very tough and making par there I think probably gained some shots on the field. And then being able to make that putt on 17 as well, closing with a birdie on 17 (inaudible).

Q. And can you just describe the conditions that you saw out there today versus the last few days out here?

PATRICK CANTLAY: Yeah, the wind was up a little bit, a little stronger than we've seen the last couple days, and the greens are firming out so it's tough to get it close. But if you hit great shots, you can be rewarded out here.
